PRIEST - IN - CHARGE

On Easter morning we proclaimed "The Lord has risen, the Lord has risen, indeed"! This is a proclamation of promise and possibilities. Should we allow ourselves to enter into the place and time of the Apostles and disciples the proclamation would have been a question as they considered that Jesus had suffered a tortuous death on the cross. It took several appearances by the Lord on several occasions to establish that He had truly risen. What they had learned and experienced before the crucifixion began to take on new meanings as they saw that God had a plan for them that would take them into the whole known world to spread a Gospel truth about God's love and forgiveness. Their mission was not bound by time or location.

Today we are no less called by the resurrection to go into the known world and spread the Gospel truth. On Maundy Thursday we washed our hands and proclaimed that they were being cleansed for service to the Lord. We serve the Lord when we serve others. We serve God and others by being present to the needs of others. One way in which we are called is by visiting shut-ins and those hospitalized. When we hear of suffering, it has become a sad cliché "our thoughts and prayers are with you". Thoughts and prayers should generate action. Perhaps it is time for St. Edmund's to consider putting together a visitation group. The purpose would not be home communion, we have folks for that, but to provide comfort and care through being present. That presence need not be limited to St. Edmund's folks. This is something to think about and pray for.

Summer is upon us. Many of our northern families have left and returned back to their summer residences. We will miss them. We urge all to keep up their pledges. Church may have slowed down, but the bills have not. In other summer news, I have a pre-surgery consultation on May 22. Surgery on my left knee should soon follow. I will make arrangements for Communion services while I am out. In June the 8:00 A.M. service will be celebrated on first and third Sundays. May God grant us all a safe and pleasant summer.

DEACON

Easter Season, those fifty days from Easter Sunday until Pentecost Sunday, is a time of immense importance in our liturgical year. The contemporary church finds much satisfaction in the joy and "alleluias" of this season celebrating the resurrection of Jesus. Certainly that hope and sense of festivity is important in our life of faith.

I find a different level of solace and inspiration in the Easter Season. I like to reflect on the passages in the Gospels and Acts of the Apostles that describe the experience of those earliest followers of Jesus in the immediate days following his death and resurrection. For them it is a time of counter-culture experience, confusion, doubt, fear, personal growth, and revelation of the future for the people of God. That, for me, addresses my reality in the 21st century.

We can start with the event of the women going to the tomb of Jesus and finding it empty. We know that the resurrected Jesus speaks to one, "Mary", and the women become the first ones to proclaim the resurrection of Jesus. His male followers have to rush to the empty tomb is verify it for themselves. In a culture that placed little value on the role women in society, this is an important episode in the story of Jesus that is repeated throughout the Gospels. It is very counter-culture to the time and subsequent centuries up to our own day.

One of my favorite Gospel accounts is the story of the journey by disciples to Emmaus on the evening of the day of resurrection. They are walking from Jerusalem to the village of Emmaus. It is clear that they are confused about events of the previous few days. A stranger joins them, and while walking, he explains much to them using the Scriptures. After arriving in Emmaus, he joined them for a meal and they realized it was the resurrected Jesus: When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight. They said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?" (Luke 24:30-32) It is a wonderful account of our experience of Christ in the Eucharist and in Scripture: "eyes are opened" and "hearts burning with us."

During the post-resurrection days Thomas is honest enough to admit his doubt and disciples live in fear. Jesus appears at various times with the common greeting of "peace be with you" to alleviate fear and doubt.

The followers of Jesus remain fearful and self-protective until the 50th day when the Spirit inspires and enables them to go forth into the world proclaiming the Good News of Jesus Christ. They become the Church with the message and ministry of Jesus.

My prayerful hope for this Easter Season is for eyes to be open, hearts burning within us, and peace being with us as we continue the work of the Church in proclaiming the message and doing the ministry of Jesus.


The ECW Officers for this year have agreed to serve another year!
