To that end, I wanted to share with you my famous Sausage Ball recipe. It has been a staple at every holiday gathering in my family for generations. It was taught to me by my mother, who learned it from my grandmother, and so on. It is elegantly simple, but never fails to please. So in honor of our retiring Deacon (who commented how much he loves these) and to commemorate the sorely missed coffee hour, I present the Wright Family Sausage Balls recipe:

Ingredients:

- 1 lb. Jimmy Dean Sausage, Mild
- 3 c Bisquick™
- 1 lb. Extra Sharp Cheddar, Shredded
- ¼ c Buttermilk

Directions (this is the fun part):


- 1) Preheat oven to 350 degrees
- 2) Grease and lightly flour a large cookie sheet

- In a big bowl, mix all ingredients together by hand until a dough is formed.
- 4) Shape into walnut-sized balls by rolling in palm
- 5) Bake for 15 minutes
- 6) Enjoy!

From the Canon to the Ordinary

Dear Friends,

On Monday 10th August I participated in my usual bi-weekly Canons and Bishops Coordination Call Zoom meeting which is organized by the Presiding Bishop's office. Our speaker on Monday was Dr. Anthony Fauci, Director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID) since 1984.

Mind you, I did not get to speak with Dr. Fauci personally— there were over 150 of us on the Zoom — but it did feel as if he was speaking to me personally. He spoke sincerely and calmly for thirty minutes, offering an expansive opening statement and then answered questions with clarity and hopefulness.

Dr. Fauci's presence on Monday was timely and helpful, particularly as we move into our fifth month of altered worship life.

Some highlights from Dr. Fauci's Q&A on Monday:

- There is a misperception in the public sphere of "all or nothing," of total shutdown or total ignoring of precautions. But this is not an accurate perception of what is possible. There is still a lot that can be done in a safe manner. Public health recommendations (and the science behind them) should be seen as a gateway for accomplishing a task and not as an obstacle that locks us in.
- Three things continue to be very effective: universal wearing of masks, physical distancing, and outdoor gathering is safer than indoor gathering.
- When experts refer to "crowds," it means congregating close together.Large groups outdoors and spaced out properly are safer than small groups in close quarters.
- Singing is worse than speaking. Singing sends out particles—science has proven this. If you can, try not to sing.

- Face shields are not as effective as masks—aerosolized particles can drop below the mask and circulate. Wearing a mask is preferable.
- Wearing a mask is not fun and it inhibits our ability to communicate in ways that we are accustomed. We like to see one another's face. Clergy may not want to wear a mask during worship so that people can really "see" them and thus "connect" with them—as much as possible, clergy should try to resist that urge to not wear a mask.
- Winter (in those places with real seasonal changes) will be problematic. If you must gather indoors, do so with windows open, temperatures and humidity levels turned up higher. We know that heat and humidity cause particles in the air to fall to the ground faster.
- This will end. We will not be living like this forever; the vaccine will help. Do not lose hope.
- Finally, Dr. Fauci expressed his heartfelt gratitude for the prayers that have surrounded him and the others working on solutions to this pandemic.

Dr. Fauci's comments may prove useful to you and your leadership teams as you continue to make decisions regarding worship and gatherings in your congregations. Bishop Smith's guidance set forth in his Ascension Day *Letter on In Person Worship* (21st May) continues to apply— that letter may be found <u>here</u>.
